Activity:

Students will make a set of Rules for Safety and Responsible Use of the Internet

The Rules can then be:

1. Posted on a wall in class.
2. Shared and compared with the rest of the class.
3. Taken home and shared with parents.

Some examples:

2. Ensure privacy settings are set appropriately for all sites and apps that you use.
3. Do not brows, or download from strange websites.
4. Use a vpn if you are on public Wi-Fi.
5. Use strong and varying passwords.

The poster can be:

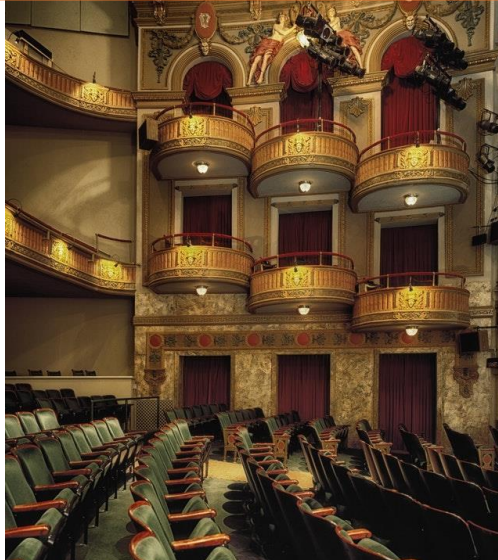
1. Posted around the school to help to ensure that students are aware of safety measures that can be applied when using the Internet and Social Media.

Extension #3: Act It Out



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Facilitator Notes:

Activity:

Have students in pairs research a scenario where a student is not practicing safe internet usage.

Students can then role play the scenario and ask students in the class what should have been done differently.

Potential scenarios:

1. A person that shares too much info online.
2. A person that has a weak or the same password across multiple accounts.
3. A person that isn't up-to-date on internet security software.

Students will creatively communicate 10 Internet Safety Rules.

The Internet Safety Rules can then be:

Extension #5: To Share Or Not To Share



Slide: To Share Or Not To Share

Facilitator Notes:

Activity:

Working in pairs or small groups, students will generate a list of personal information that is safe to share with others in their online communications.

They will then generate a list of examples of personal information that should not be shared in their online communications.

Students can then create:

1. a poster;
2. a video;
3. an announcement; or
4. a mock radio show;

To share the information they have acquired

Example of Things Safe to Share:

1. Usernames for games you play as long as its not your real name.

Example of Things Not Safe to Share:

1. Real Name;
2. Passwords;
3. Location or names of places nearby;
4. School you go to;
5. Age; or
6. Date of Birth;

Extension #6: Write About It



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Facilitator Notes:

Activity:

Write a paragraph about a student who has experienced cyber bullying. Give the student advice listing ways they can get help.

List of ways to help:

1. talk to a trusted adult about the incident;
2. save every uncomfortable conversation and share it with a trusted adult;
3. talk to school resources like teachers or the principal; and/or
4. talk to the police;
